FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER - YEAR B

John 10:11–18

Context Connection

Throughout the Old Testament, God is often spoken of as the shepherd of the Chosen People. You may be most familiar with this image from Psalm 23: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not want" (verse 1). This image was added to after the Assyrians conquered the northern kingdom of Israel and after the Babylonians conquered the southern kingdom of Judah and exiled the Israelites to Babylon. During this time, God was often presented as the future shepherd (see Isaiah 49:8–10, Jeremiah 31:10, and Ezekiel 34:11–16).

In the New Testament, and in this week's Gospel, John uses both a present and a future image of the good shepherd, saying that Jesus is in fact the Good Shepherd right now ("I am the good shepherd" [John 10:11]), and that the good shepherd will go to the extreme and lay down his life for his sheep (see John 10:15). This will be an act of total loving, of complete self-sacrifice. It is by free choice that Jesus will lay down his own life, as he says himself. Today we know why he did this: in order to take life up again for our salvation. Jesus freely gave up his life out of love for all humankind.

John uses the term *Good Shepherd* in contrast to *bad shepherd*. A bad shepherd would be an individual who would lead those placed in his or her care into harm's way. Such a shepherd would no doubt be self-centered and therefore unable to make the kinds of sacrifices that would benefit the flock. The concept of love and concern for others would be utterly foreign to this kind of person.

By way of contrast, and according to John, Jesus is a shepherd who leads his flock in ways of truth and righteousness. Jesus, as the Good Shepherd, seeks those who have lost their way in order to bring them back into the ways of truth and righteousness. He never stops practicing fidelity to his flock, his followers.

Tradition Connection

The bond between the shepherd and the sheep described in this passage is a close-knit one. In the story, the shepherd calls out and the sheep hear the voice of the shepherd and follow him. In return, the shepherd cares for and nurtures the sheep. The shepherd willingly and always places himself at the service of the sheep.

Another example of Jesus's acting as the Good Shepherd in the New Testament is found in John 13:1–15. In this passage, Jesus washes the feet of his Apostles. He models for them his understanding of how to lead, how to shepherd people. He models service. He says that he has come to serve and not to be served.

The Catholic Church uses the term *pastoral care* or *pastoral outreach* to describe the many services the parish community provides to those in need. Pastoral care includes care for the members of one's own parish community, such as visiting the sick and home bound, assisting a family as its members grieve the loss of a loved one, providing food and clothing to parish members who are laid off or are otherwise unable to find employment. Pastoral care also includes outreach to people beyond the members of the parish, such as working in soup kitchens that serve food to those in need of a meal, working in food or clothing pantries that supply people with those necessities, providing "buddies" for those in the larger community who, because of illness or other factors, may

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need a friend for companionship.

Traditionally, we call these pastoral actions corporal works of mercy or acts of charity—in other words, actions with the goal of caring for the bodily needs of other people. We are all called to follow the model of Jesus, to perform these corporal works of mercy. We are all called to be good shepherds, to be individuals who care for others by serving their needs. Some of us may have had an opportunity or many opportunities to serve through a service project in our parish or school. Some of us may never have participated in this kind of service. We must strive to practice these corporal works of mercy as much as we are able. The Gospel today reminds us that this care for others is a lifelong reality, a way of life for anyone who follows Jesus. Ask your parents, teachers, or pastor what you can do to help others in need.

Wisdom Connection

This passage is about a way of being in relationship with Jesus. Jesus, as the Good Shepherd, intimately knows each of us, his flock, through his personal relationship with us. In knowing each disciple personally, Jesus is able to guide and care for the individual in a unique way. As the Good Shepherd, Jesus only wills good for those who follow him.
