During Fr Marty's holiday period (June 12-July 3), he has the following reflections for you to consider in light of the lockdown, which we are slowly coming out of. These responses will cover the next three weeks of the newsletter.

Do you have some scripture or readings that you found useful in understanding this unprecedented time in our history?

Hebrews 10:23, "Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for (he) who promised is faithful." Hope is the key to getting through this time, and as the sun rises and the curve is lessened, we are stepping out into the light.

- What advice do you have for teachers in helping us to nurture and respond to the spirituality and faith of young people during this time?
- What advice would you have for teachers in responding to the questions and experiences of students they face challenge of this pandemic as young people?

Fr Marty: I think you have to acknowledge as teachers what the world is going through at this time-personally. As you know, students know your 'vibe'. They know when you are authentic and when you are off key. Don't ask the students (collectively in class time) what they think, because that might not be the right place for sharing. As you know often the enthusiastic will speak first without much thought and that can drive the deeper thinkers not to respond.

In the last few days as the lockdown has eased and students have come back to school, especially teenagers, they have been hugging and laughing and pushing and shoving. They have come up with

crazy dances on TikTok. They have joked about 'Corona', they have watched Netflix and YouTube like they always do and live in their student world, mostly online and pages and pages of texting about 'god knows what'. They continue to play and laugh. No sense of social distancing! Yet this is where it is important to remember there is the adult world and the student world.

As adults we have been listening to adult leaders and a vast response for a large section of society. Yet this is not the student world. Just take Easter Sunday night at Burleigh Heads, Gold Coast, hundreds congregated amid the restrictions. Why? That's what young people do.

Somewhere in the midst of that great reality (adult and student world) there is the meaning and truth of what this all means. If you can find that comfortable space with students, you will find the precious answers from them to this event, in this time.

Therefore, I would advise maintaining a routine for the students and if the opportunity arises and students want to speak, and if they feel comfortable in your presence, they will tell you what they think. It has certainly been my experience as a school teacher.

Students will always share if they feel valued and respected. In this, your sense of spirituality and theirs, will come out. It's a beautiful opportunity, yet it has to be handled with delicately. As you all know, all too well.

4. How do you see the Church emerging from a post-Covid 19 world?

Fr Marty: Slowly.

Not because of Government or political rhetoric, yet because of the contact between humans.

Life in some ways has changed permanently.

Particularly with travel and large events. It's amazing to think 2 weeks before the lockdown 80,000 people were at the MGC for the Australian Women's World Cup cricket final! We won't see that again for some time. As with church gatherings.

We have seen that social distancing has made a difference in slowing down this event. Yet at the same time, we are about to enter into the colder weather and naturally people will get sick. I believe people will be patient with this, yet a lot of people will be wondering what Christmas is like if we can have a crowd of people.

Easter in one sense was great because it was contained. We were locked down and we live streamed. It was comfortable.

Christmas will need to be carefully looked at if we can go ahead with larger numbers. Maybe we need to simply live stream, make it creative, so that people can feel safe, yet still celebrate.

Yet I guess, at the end of the day, just to go the baby steps. Win the small logistical battles which are ahead (that's such a parish priest thing to say) and continue to believe God is with us in all of this.

So with that in mind, I would love to bless you in the here and now.

God bless you in your teaching. God bless your families and your students and their families. God bless your leadership team, and as always, I will see you....around.
