How do we bring balance to the world around us and with our God?

How to live the Gospel out this weekend.



Can you believe it is the 30th Sunday in Ordinary time!!! That means its five weeks away from Advent. The most beautiful Gospel is read this Sunday. Quite simply, the whole of our very lives ride of these two simple commands. Love God. Love each other, as we love ourselves. That is the box and dice right there. Such beautiful simplicity. God and Love. Yet reality kicks in and as human beings we start to ask the questions. How do I love God? And how can I love my neighbour? There are no easy ways to answer this, yet it must be worked at constantly. Firstly, in loving self, there always needs to be an appreciation that we come from God. We are not a right, we are a blessing and revelation from God. We are willed into this life to be of service to God. If we can keep sight of that, then we are doing well. Our bodies are temples, which we reside in for a time. We are not owed anything, other than to give back to God. Secondly, to try and find the good in others. We don't have to like everyone, and not everyone is going to be our friend. Yet, we do need to find ways to understand people and their guirks. That's what makes humanity unique. If we were all the same, the world would be a boring place. We don't have to like everyone, yet we need to find ways to at least respect people and their life position. If we can keep all of this in mind, we are doing the will of God.

This is not easy, yet this is the mark of a Christian and what sets us more inline with the heart of God, rather than the heart of society and consumerism. The secular world, for all its good, can be a heartless place. We need to draw more deeply into the heart of God.
