FUN FACT FOR SUNDAY August 1, 2021



St Alphonsus de' Liguori. Born in Naples Italy 1696. He became a lawyer with a brilliant career ahead of him. One day he lost a case. This event devastated his life and he decided to join the priesthood. Despite his father's objections he was ordained 1726. With a background in law, Alphonsus soon became known for his preaching, and after two attempts founded the congregation of Redemptorists.

Wishing to gain royal approval for his congregation he signed a document without properly reading it; he had been tricked by a member of the order. The new 'Rule' of the order basically excluded Alphonsus from the order he founded. Despite all his set backs and the people deceiving him, he continued to love God and serve the people of the Italian countryside. No matter what, we can all have the courage to continue what life gives us.



As a faith community, we all have our stories. Our faith story as a church has been handed down for over 2000 years. Many saints and sinners who all form up our collective history. Our story as a church is both a beacon for hope, a shining light in the darkness.

The physicist Stephen Hawking observes in the conclusion of his best seller, 'A Brief History of Time' "We find ourselves in a bewildering world. We want to make sense of what we see around us and to ask, "What is the nature of the universe, what is our place in it and where do we come from? Why is it the way it is? In an attempt to come to terms with these fundamental questions, we adopt a world picture. In other words we call upon our story to help us navigate our way through life."

At this time, when families cannot catch up with people from other states, its important to remember our story. Who are the characters in our lives, family and friends and who are those people who can be that listening ear? You may come from a different culture and that can bring a new lense to how family is shaped. What have been the times of celebration for you? What have been the highs and what have been the lows? How do we make sense of family at this time?

And finally, something to ponder from Ron Rolheiser:

Studying Aquinas helped introduce me to myself. I was nineteen years old when I first met his thought and, although some of his insights were a bit beyond my young mind, I understood enough to find in him not just some legitimization for how I was feeling but also, more importantly, a meta-narrative within which to understand why I was feeling the way I did.

Aquinas asks: "What is the adequate object of the human mind and heart?" In other words, what would we have to experience in order to be fully satisfied? His answer: All being, everything! What would we have to experience to be fully satisfied is *everything*. We would have to know everything and be known by everybody, a human impossibility in this life, and so it shouldn't be a mystery as to why we live in perpetual disquiet and why (as French philosopher Blaise Pascal says) all the miseries of the human being come from the fact that we can't sit still in a room for one hour.

Some years later, I was introduced to the writings of Henri Nouwen and he, perhaps more than anyone else, gave me permission to feel what I feel. Nouwen was such a powerful writer because he was so honest in sharing his own neediness, restlessness, and disquiet. He had a singular talent for tracing out the restless movements within our souls. For instance, in describing his own struggles, he writes: "I want to be a saint, but I also want to experience all the sensations that sinners experience. Small wonder, that life is a struggle."

Some people talk about the people they would like to meet in heaven. These are some of the people who have helped me understand what it means to walk on this earth.

Safeguarding News

New laws targeting sexual offences against children

The Government has introduced new laws that target behaviour which ignores or conceals child sexual abuse. The new laws mean that <u>all</u> adults in Queensland now have a legal duty to:

- report sexual offending against children by other adults to the police; and
- protect children from the risk of sexual abuse by other adults in an institution (e.g. a school, church or sporting club).

The laws commenced on 5 July 2021 and carry up to 5 years imprisonment.


