

How to live the Gospel out this weekend.

In one sense the question Jesus asks in today's extract from Mark is out of character. A close read of the gospels gives us the impression that Jesus was not really bothered about what people thought of him. Personal honour was important to him, but reputation in the eyes of others was of no consequence. So, this question may well be a literary device of Mark to raise the issue of Jesus' person and role, and force the disciples to come up with an answer. After all, here is a pivotal teaching moment in the very mid-point of Mark's gospel when, through Peter, we get a specific revelation that Jesus is Israel's messiah.

But then Jesus gave them strict orders not to tell anybody. Why? The problem is people in general believed the messiah would be a righteous royal warrior figure who would save the land from Roman occupation and restore Israel's sovereignty. Jesus was not this kind of messiah and he did not want anyone running off with this idea about him. In fact, he went on to state a paradox by describing himself as a suffering messiah. Well, this was not part of Jewish tradition and Peter couldn't handle the idea of Jesus being made to suffer rejection by the religious leaders and then to be murdered. This was utterly outrageous and so Peter took Jesus aside and protested that this couldn't happen.

The response from Jesus is a strong one. The mention of Satan here gives us a clue to the power of the temptation facing Jesus and we get a more striking view of this temptation when Jesus prays in the garden of Gethsemane. In effect, Jesus is saying that Peter is thinking like the Tempter and not in tune with God's plan.

There is an irony here when we realise that this crucial revelation is made at Caesarea Philippi. In ancient times this place was called Paneas were there was a shrine to the Greek god Pan. The Canaanites also worshipped Baal here and in the time of Jesus Herod Philip had set up a shrine to Augustus as a centre of emperor worship. So, in a place where many gods had been worshipped we are given a glimpse of the divinity in Jesus. The lesson for the disciples is that the divinity of the emperor is fake whereas the divinity in Jesus is authentic.

Finally, there is a message for the early Christian communities that their commitment to Christ will inevitably bring them ridicule and criticism, perhaps even physical persecution. Anyone who values life over following Jesus will lose it, but those who are prepared to sacrifice life and limb to belong to Jesus Christ will gain authentic life.

Christian commitment involves self-giving in service of others. The life and death of Jesus was a total gift of himself. Just to meditate quietly on his generosity is mind-blowing. As he said, there is no greater gift than life itself for another. In no uncertain terms James urges us to put our money where our mouth is and be committed to the service of others. We may never know how a small undetectable act of generosity might change someone's life forever. When we finally move on, the only things we can take with us are the things we have given away.
