

Reflection on the Gospel



In the second temptation Jesus is offered glory if he worships Satan. Jesus replies with a quotation that refers to the weakness of the Israelites when they worshipped other deities. Jesus, on the other hand, remains firm in his commitment to the one God. Finally, Satan tempts Jesus to jump from the highest point of the Temple in Jerusalem and again Jesus in response quotes from Deuteronomy alluding to the time when the Israelites provoked God at Massah by doubting that God was with them and caring for them. In every case the Israelites failed God while Jesus passes with flying colours. Luke is pointing to Jesus as the divinely anointed messiah of Israel who will overcome evil in establishing the reign of God.

Both Matthew and Luke are reflecting a tradition that grew up in early Christianity about the temptations of Christ. The tradition has stylised the temptations presenting them in the classic three and relating them in theological fashion to Jesus' messianic mission. That Jesus had a conversation with the Satan is quite unlikely, but that is not the point. Matthew and Luke are giving us a richly symbolic narrative that is a literary way of showing how Jesus wins out in the face of temptation where the Israelites under Moses in the desert failed the test. Putting theology aside for a moment we can appreciate how the human Jesus withdrew into the desert to work out his next move.

He was certainly driven by the Spirit to recognise a prophetic call. His question was, do I take the plunge and work publicly as a prophet and risk being vilified and persecuted, like John and all the prophets of the past, or do I just settle back in Nazareth in anonymity and safety? This was a dramatic turning point in his life, at age 32 or so. The desert experience was clearly a time of prayer and discernment. We know that Jesus not only went ahead and took the risk but did so with a passion that was expressed in deep commitment to the divine call. He braced himself for the times when he would be lonely, misunderstood even by his closest friends, criticised and persecuted. Jesus exemplified the truth of another of Meister Eckhart's wise remarks: The price of inaction is far greater than the cost of making a mistake. Courage and commitment relying on God's infinite compassion assured Jesus that he would be metaphorically borne up by angels and sheltered under the wings of the Most High. Am I driven to inaction by fear and anxiety, or am I prepared to take a risk?
