

Zech 9:9-10; Rom 8:9, 11-13; Matt 11:25-30

From last Sunday's reading at the end of chapter 10 we have leapt to the end of the next. The prayer of Jesus that opens today's gospel reading begins like many biblical prayers, but it has much in common with Daniel 2:23. Daniel's Aramaic text has a two verb construction, usually translated as give thanks and praise, but Matthew's account has only one verb, the same as the Septuagint's translation for Daniel's first verb, but the Greek version translates variously to confess, profess and praise. Daniel's prayer (2:20-23) is in the first part of the first story of king Nebuchadnezzar's dreams, but this section with Daniel's prayer is not employed anywhere in our Lectionary although it might better accompany today's gospel reading than Zechariah 9:9-10, the source for Palm Sunday's image of the humble king riding a donkey. Daniel's context is important: Nebuchadnezzar was troubled by incomprehensible dreams, but he set an impossible task for his "wise men" (astrologers, magicians, sorcerers, etc.); they were both to tell him his dream and explain it without him telling them what he had dreamed. They could not do so, and they told him "no man" could, so he ordered their execution. Daniel, the wise Hebrew youth and interpreter of dreams, and his three friends (famous for their hymn of praise while in the furnace) were caught up by this edict. They sought God's mercy in prayer; the mystery was revealed to Daniel, who cries out: "Blessed be the name of God forever, for wisdom and majesty are his ... he confers wisdom on the wise and knowledge on the discerning, revealing deep and hidden things ... to you, God of my fathers, I give thanks and praise for giving me wisdom and understanding, and making known to me what we asked..." This saved Daniel, his friends, and all the witless men.

Jesus' prayer draws from Daniel's text. Its place in Matthew is of interest, for it follows directly after the lament over Chorazin, Bethsaida and Capernaum, which had not repented even after the miracles worked in them, unlike Nebuchadnezzar, who repented at each turn and whose last words in Daniel are in praise to God. Matthew presents Jesus as another but greater Daniel; to him is revealed a greater mystery, made clear in the next verse (v.27): the mutual and reciprocal knowing of the Father and Son is unique, so Jesus knows God the Father's hidden mysteries, and in him God knows by direct experience humanity's trials. God's response is mercy. The invitation that follows (v.28-30), "Come to me..." is unique to Matthew. It is related to Sirach (Ecclesiasticus) 51:23-30, the second part of the poem to Wisdom in that book's appendix which incorporates an element from Jeremiah 6:16 where the reward for returning to the true way of the covenant is finding rest for your souls. Jesus is the true way; to come to him is to walk in the way of true wisdom, understanding and surrendering oneself to God's rule, submitting to the gentle yoke of God's law of love and mercy. The two Sabbath day stories that immediately follow (Matt 12:1-14, but which are not in our Sunday Lectionary), the picking of grain and the healing of a man's withered hand, are directly linked to today's pericope. In them Jesus challenges the Pharisees' strict but unmerciful interpretation of the Sabbath law of rest. He reminds them of Hosea 6:6, "I want mercy, not sacrifice". Thus today's passage is a critical point in Matthew, for when application of its merciful teaching violates the Pharisees' understanding of the Sabbath law of

rest, they begin to plot to destroy Jesus. The question for our communities is: Do we embody the teachings of Jesus, who himself embodies the mercy of God? If not, then why should anyone come and abide with us in whom we say the Spirit of God and of Christ has made a home (cf. Rom 8:9)?

SECOND READING Rom 8:9,11-13 If by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body, you will live.

Your interests are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him, and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! Blessed are you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth; you have revealed to little ones the mysteries of the kingdom. Alleluia!

GOSPEL Mt 11;25-30 I am gentle and humble of heart.

Jesus exclaimed, 'I bless you, Father, Lord of heaven and of earth, for hiding these things from the learned and the clever and revealing them to mere children. Yes, Father, for that is what it pleased you to do. Everything has been entrusted to me by my Father; and no one knows the Son except the Father, just as no one knows the Father except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him.
