SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT - YEAR B

Mark 9:2-10

Context Connection

In this Sunday's Gospel, we have the wonderful account of Jesus's Transfiguration, with Moses and Elijah standing on either side of him. Mark wants us to know that Jesus is a great prophet and giver of a new law, the law of love. Jesus brings together the whole of the law of the Old Testament and puts it before us in a prophetic way when he answers the question "Which is the first of all the commandments?" Jesus answers that the greatest commandment is to love God with our whole heart, our whole soul, our whole mind, and our whole strength. He says the second greatest commandment is to "love your neighbour as yourself" (Mark 12:29–31). Jesus's answer encases the whole of the Ten Commandments.

Jesus takes Peter, James, and John with him to the top of the hill to witness the Transfiguration. In two other places in Mark's Gospel, Jesus singles out these three to accompany him. In Mark 5:37, Jesus brings Jairus's daughter back to life in the presence of Peter, James, and John. In Mark 14:33, Jesus asks the three to keep watch with him in the garden at Gethsemane. Through these experiences and others, Peter, James, and John come to a special understanding of Jesus's divine glory.

Peter, James, and John also come to the knowledge that Jesus is the fulfillment of the prophets and of all the law. At the Transfiguration, Mark writes that Elijah and Moses appear alongside Jesus. Elijah is known as the greatest of the prophets and Moses as the giver of the Law. Elijah and Moses act as witnesses, certifying that Jesus is the glorious fulfillment of the law and the prophets. For more about Elijah, see 1 Kings, chapters 17–19, as well as 2 Kings, chapters 1 and 2.

Of great significance in Mark 9:2–10 is the reoccurrence of the heavenly voice we first hear at Jesus's baptism in Mark 1:11. In 9:8, the voice says: "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him." By including this part of the scene, Mark reemphasizes that Jesus is the Son of God.

The Transfiguration event in Mark's "Shema" is the climax of Jesus's public life. From this point forward, Jesus is moving toward Jerusalem and his Crucifixion.

Tradition Connection

Every year on August 6, the Catholic Church observes the feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord and commemorates the event atop Mount Tabor, a mountain in the region of Galilee. This location has long been held by tradition, specifically through the writings of Origen (AD 185–232), to be the place where the Transfiguration occurred.

The Transfiguration was a way to prepare the Apostles for the coming of the death of Jesus. Jesus's Crucifixion would be the culmination point and the fulfillment of the salvation of God. Both the Law and the prophets speak about the suffering the Messiah will have to endure and that the Messiah will, through suffering, obtain glory. As Catholics, we see the Transfiguration as a

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foreshadowing of the glorious Second Coming of Jesus, but before then, the Church will have to encounter many persecutions. The faithful, as the Body of Christ, will partake in the suffering of Jesus so they can also partake in the glory of the Resurrection.

Wisdom Connection

Mark writes about this event because of the hope it gives the disciples during the trial and Crucifixion of Jesus. Mark confirms that Jesus is the Son of God and the Son of Man, that he is both divine and human. As the Son of Man, Jesus knows intimately what it is like to be a human person. He knows the ups and the downs, as well as the happy times and the really challenging times. As the Son of God, Jesus reveals to us his divine glory through the Transfiguration. He shows us that he is the presence of God. He remains present in the whole of our lives. Continue to seek out his presence.

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Youth - Scripture Reflections 2nd Sunday of Lent—Year B

LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Gen 22:1-2,9-13 The sacrifice of Abraham, our father in faith.

God put Abraham to the test. 'Abraham, Abraham' he called. 'Here I am' he replied. 'Take your son,' God said your only child Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him as a burnt offering, on a mountain I will point out to you.'

When they arrived at the place God had pointed out to him, Abraham built an altar there and arranged the wood. Then he stretched out his hand and seized the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called to him from heaven, 'Abraham, Abraham' he said. 'I am here' he replied. 'Do not raise your hand against the boy' the angel said. 'Do not harm him, for now I know you fear God. You have not refused me your son, your only son.' Then looking up, Abraham saw a ram caught by its horns in a bush. Abraham took the ram and offered it as a burnt-offering in place of his son.

The angel of the Lord called Abraham a second time from heaven. 'I swear by my own self - it is the Lord who speaks - because you have done this, because you have not refused me your son, your only son, I will shower blessings on you, I will make your descendants as many as the stars of heaven and the grains of sand on the seashore. Your descendants shall gain possession of the gates of their enemies. All the nations of the earth shall bless themselves by your descendants, as a reward for your obedience.'

RESPONSORIAL R. I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living.

I trusted, even when I said:'I am sorely afflicted.' O precious in the eyes of the Lord is the death of his faithful. R.

Your servant, Lord, your servant am I; you have loosened my bonds. A thanksgiving sacrifice I make:I will call on the Lord's name. R.

My vows to the Lord I will fulfil before all his people, in the courts of the house of the Lord, in your midst, O Jerusalem. R.

SECOND READING Rom 8:31-34 God did not spare his own Son.

With God on our side who can be against us? Since God did not spare his own Son, but gave him up to benefit us all, we may be certain, after such a gift, that he will not refuse anything he can give. Could anyone accuse those that God has chosen? When God acquits, could anyone condemn? Could Christ Jesus? No! He not only died for us - he rose from the dead, and there at God's right hand he stands and pleads for us.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, alleluia! Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! From the shining cloud the Father's voice I heard: this is my beloved Son, hear him. Glory and praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ! Alleluia!

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GOSPEL Mk 9:2-10 This is my Son, the beloved; listen to him.

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by themselves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus. 'Rabbi,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.
